Re: American Attitudes About Iran

Date: December 9, 2013

"Finally, we have found an issue of substance that both Democrats and Republicans agree on. The fear of Iranian nuclear weapons unites just about everyone."

That is the key result of a survey of 900 likely voters taken December 7-9, 2013 that asks what Americans think of negotiations between their government and Iran. For us, this is the first time this year that an issue of this significance generates almost universal support across the demographic and political landscape:

By lopsided margins, supporters of both political parties overwhelmingly favored renewed sanctions against the Iranian government, in addition to and regardless of current negotiations. Younger Obama voters and older Romney voters BOTH want the American negotiators to insist on a non-nuclear Iran, and they want sanctions to remain until that objective is met.

Here are the four essential findings:

(1) The Iranian government is more feared by Americans than all the other Middle Eastern countries combined. Half (49%) picked Iran as the greatest threat to the United States, more than Iraq (15%), Pakistan (13%), Afghanistan (12%), and Syria (9%) combined. Iran ranks first in fear among every age, education, and partisan subgroup.

On closer examination, the reason for this fear is because of Iran's nuclear efforts. The numbers are clear and compelling:

- -- Just 7% of Americans trust the Iranian claim that their nuclear program is exclusively peaceful and they are not seeking to develop weapons, while a sizeable 77% are afraid of Iran's intentions.
- -- The biggest fear from Iran: that they would provide terrorist groups hostile to America and the West access to nuclear weapons. No other concern comes close, and once again, Democrats and Republicans agree.
- -- The solution: 43% of Democrats and 44% of Republicans picked "further economic sanctions and financial pressure." The next highest response, more negotiations and less financial pressure, received 19% (24% among Democrats and only 12% among Republicans).



- (2) <u>Americans are universally skeptical about Iranian intentions.</u> People don't just harbor considerable concern over Iran's past actions. There's little faith that the Iranian government will improve upon its track record as talks progress. The simple truth is that Americans just do not trust the intentions of the Iranian government. Consider the following critical findings:
 - -- An overwhelming 86% (78% among Democrats and 95% among Republicans) think Iran will break its promises during the negotiation process, while only 14% say they will keep them.
 - -- A staggeringly low 16% believe Iran is "negotiating in good faith and will eventually give up their ability to make nuclear weapons," while the vast majority of Americans (84%) think Iran is using negotiations "to stall as they continue to develop their ability to make nuclear weapons."
- (3) Americans want negotiations AND accountability (namely, sanctions). The American people have no appetite for the perennial Reaganesque "trust, but verify" approach with Iran. Only 11% believe that the right strategy is to remove sanctions during the negotiations, while 71% believe that increased sanctions and financial pressure are necessary (regardless of how they feel about the overall approach).
 - Almost 8 out of 10 Americans (77%) Democrats and Republicans alike believe the most effective path to eliminating Iran's ability to make nuclear weapons lies firmly in **further economic sanctions and financial pressure**. On the flip side of the diplomatic coin, only 23% believe continued negotiations coupled with a *reduction in financial pressure* is the course to pursue.
- (4) <u>Iran capabilities need to be limited both before AND after a final deal is done.</u> Frankly, Americans don't want Iran to have any nuclear capabilities now or ever. Only a meager 14% believe we should allow Iran to possess the nuclear fuel cycle technology that leaves the ability to develop nuclear weapons regardless of the diplomatic efforts. Conversely, 86% overall (81% of Democrats and 93 % of Republicans) think we should prohibit Iran from possessing any sort of enrichment or related nuclear fuel capability again, regardless of where the talks stand.

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As for the partisan politics of Iranian sanctions and negotiations... there aren't any. Fully 77% of Democrats and a near unanimous 96% of Republicans would rather vote for a Senator who favors increased pressure on Iran until they remove their nuclear capabilities, while only 14% would vote for the Senator who wants to reduce pressure on Iran, trusting them to end their nuclear capabilities as a result of these negotiations.

The prevailing mindset? Verify, don't trust.
